And our condolences and sympathies extend to those who have lost a loved one. The text of the newspaper obituaries are copied later in this issue.

Twenty years of Teator Reunions allowed me to forge a bond of family and friendship with John and Charlie, and I will miss both.

And the loss of my Aunt Charlotte stirs a sense of loss, with memories of my father, and we boys in tow, visiting his sister and, of course, my cousins. (Was that fifty years ago?) And with Charlotte's passing, I realized I am the oldest living descendent of Orlando and Glenna (Fitch) Teator. Wow!

If I have missed any other vitals, please let me know and I will try to catch up in the next newsletter. Because there are a half-dozen people whose addresses I don't have, I have some spots I have been unable to fill in.

Different note:

I am letting technology catch up, and I am making an email of this newsletter. I will not share your email address with anyone else; this includes our Reunion group, unless you give specific permission.

(Later in this newsletter, I have made a list of the people I send to; those who are not on the list might enjoy keeping up-to-date by email.)

I will also put these newsletters, starting with this one, on my website (www.dteator.com, click on "Genealogy"), and I may even try to include a few past ones also. Same website.

Although I do have a Facebook account, I only sporadically check it, and prefer not to put personal Teator Reunion stuff on Facebook, although it would be a good way to disseminate non-personal information (like the Reunion date), and several of you are already on my Friends list. Still, I will refrain.

My latest research effort consists of my scouring the 1940 census. The US Government mandates a waiting period of 70 years before the release of next census and, thus, anyone younger than 74 years of age should not be appearing on this list.

My recent subscription to Ancestry allowed me easy access to the records and I am summarizing what I found. It is a pleasant shock to see familiar names in a list of thousands, which I am sure is a common reaction for many genealogists. It does flesh out some details about those living in 1940, and I also find it interesting to see who the neighbors are

The deceased, of course, will not be seen in a census (well, there is an exception, but not part of this story). Those names familiar to us but were deceased before this census: John and Lydia (Richmond) Teter, as

well as all of the second generation: Alexander and Elsie (Sweet) Teator, Angeline (Teter) and Charles Radick, David W. and Belle (Steadman) Teter, Rachel (Teter) and John Gillespie, Elnora (Teter) and Youmans Cantine, Orlando S. and Emma (Wheeler) Teter, and Maryetta Teter.

This last paragraph is my sneaky way of reminding all of you who the children of John and Lydia are. **Test questions coming up!** 1- Which two second-generation lines still have descendants alive today? 2- And, which second-generation line is the one that ended most recently? (Answer at end of newsletter)

Although there is nobody from the third generation still living, almost all are in the 1940 census. The most recently deceased of this generation are recent enough, for some, to feel like it was not that long ago: Norman Teator (1999), Walter Pearson (2000)

Many names of the fourth generation are found in the 1940 census. So, in no particular order, the records follow.

Mass.

Baldwin, Vernon: head of household, 39, dairy farm

Nora: wife, 29 Kenneth: son, 7

Town of Durham

Teator, Olin: head of household, 37, laborer – day work, house value \$1100; income \$800 Grace E: wife, 41

Martha E: daughter, 16

Robert: son, 15

Catharine: daughter, 8

Bradley: son, 6

Glenna E: sister, 31, \$100 income

Fanning: son, 9

(my note: Glenna, of course, is not Olin's sister; crossed out is the word "daughter"; I can only guess what was said to the census taker)

Teator, Orlando: head of household, 34, laborer – day work; \$400 income

Donald: son, 11 Ferris: son, 10 Barbara: daughter, 8 Charlotte: daughter, 6

(my note: obvious by her absence is Glenna,

found at Olin's household)

Town of Rensselaerville, Preston Hollow

Teater, Willis: head of household, 28, road work construction, house value \$3500, income \$500

Freda: wife, 22, lived in Broome Co 5 years before

Norman: son, 3 Alfreda: daughter, 1 Rose: daughter, 8 mos.

(my note: not the surname spelling one

would expect)

Town of Rensselaerville, Preston Hollow

Radick, Zina: head of household, 61, deputy sheriff, house value \$4000, income \$480

Mary: wife, 63

Town of Rensselaerville, Preston Hollow

Radick, Charles A: head of household, 34, renting

Doris: wife 33

Nancy A: daughter, 9

Town of Middleburg

Radick Norman: head of household, 59, salesman - Monumental Comp.

Jessie: wife, 60

Missing:

I could not find Mary Teter: But there is a record of a Mary A. Teeter, 36, five years previous lived in Maple Creek, Greene Co, lived in house hold of Louis Schofield, Village of Sidney, Delaware Co; our Mary?

And, to recognize the inclusion of Wayne and Susan, I'll add a few more records:

Cornelia K Sherman: mother in law, 65 (my notes: the surname spelling deviates from our expectation; and the mother in law designation drew my attention; is this accurate?)

A note about census records:

Genealogists should never depend on one census to serve as a primary source to prove a connection. However, it is such a valuable resource that they are often used as a starting point and, sometimes, through consistency, may be used to prove a connection.

Others I could not locate were: Ruth (Teter) Hallock, and George and May (Radick) White (perhaps, deceased by 1940) If I left anyone out, let me know I found disconcerting that four of the seven lines (ok, three of six, since Maryetta died in infancy) had ended by 1940.

By the time this letter arrives, I hope Spring is finally making an appearance.

If you have a question about Teator/Teter genealogy, ask me, or email, and I will see what I can find.

I will try to have a Teator/Teter genealogy computer file that can be shared with anyone wanting it by Reunion time.

(Answers to the test questions)

The two continuing lines from the second generation are: Alexander Teter, Charles Radick Most recent line ended: Elnora's line (the Elnora who married Youmans Cantine), which ended with the passing of Walter Pearson in 2000.
