Our March 9th meeting was a hybrid - part program and part share.

Debbie Magee was the program part. Debbie, who works for the Nature Conservancy, explained what the Conservancy is and does. Several brochures and newspapers were available for further information.

Most of her program was a presentation of the Town Park project. The Park Planning Committee is proposing the purchase of the Davidson property, much of which are the fields of the old Vanderbilt farm that borders the school on the south, Ames and the Bryant's project on the north, the Basic Creek on the west, and the back of the homes on the Western side of Rt. 32 on the east. An access road just south of Greenwood Apartments would lead into the 170 acre lot. This lot will be bought for \$230,000, with \$150,000 coming from the Iroquois Gas Company, \$44,000 from the town's park fund, and the remaining \$36,000 to be the object of a fundraising project. Debbie hoped that GLHG members would be able to help this fund-raising effort.

The remainder of the night was a share session.

Harriet Rasmussen added information on one more line,
the Vanderbilts. In addition, Harriet wrote the history of
the rocking share that belonged to her grandparents Griffin.

John Earl updated us on his blacksmith efforts. He brought an oversized door handle, as well as old blacksmith shop photos and a WWII newspaper.

Robert Uzzilia brought a large scrapbook that was created by the Ayres family, one of whom was an early principal of the Greenville Academy.

Arlene Brown contributed a newspaper clipping of the gazebo at Christmas, some of the material from the WWII program, old business stationary, and several business cards.

Don, as usual, had a few items to bring up. One was a reminder that the photography contest for the 1994 calendar is one year away. Just a reminder: photos must be black & white, 8x10, and show some aspect of Greenville local history. A copy of the rules has been mailed out once; should you need more copies, please let Don know. A copy of the contest rules will be enclosed in next month's newsletter.

Second, Don proposed donations from the GLHG treasury. One donation, showing our support for the continued use of a historic Greenville building, would go to the Library for its expansion project. The second donation, showing our commitment to the growth of our community, would go to the town park project. Don's suggestion was \$1,000 for the library and \$300-\$500 for the town park. As an alternative, Harriet suggested that two equal sums be given to both. Please consider whether you think we should make any donation, and if we do so, in what amount. Since a decision will probably be made at the April meeting, and if you can't attend this meeting but have an opinion on the subject, please let someone who usually attends to voice your

preference.

(Currently, the GLHG treasury stands at about \$2500. About \$1000 should be retained for calendar expenses for the 1993 calendar.)

Last, Don explained his cemetery project. The first part is to photograph all headstones in the abandoned cemeteries (#4-#27 on the attached list). Don explained that Debbie and he would do this during his April school break. The second part involved a request for help. Each cemetery should be mapped; a drawing of rough scale should be made with the general placement of headstones (and other stones and objects) indicated. The general shape of the stone would be sketched. Transcriptions of epitaphs would be recorded.

What can you do? On your own, or by teaming up, take one (or more) of the cemeteries and create a map and record the epitaphs. A list of cemeteries and a cemetery project done by Thurman Bishop for the Town of Westerlo are included. Feel free to recruit non-GLHG people to help or to do a cemetery. Please, no moving of headstones — this is not a preservation project, only a recording of the current status of each cemetery. Even a mid-size stone can weigh hundreds of pounds.

When should you be doing this? This project can be done anytime, but April and early May would seem to be ideal times. The ground is reasonably firm, the grass is still low, the bugs haven't yet made life miserable, and the poison ivy should be at low levels. If you choose a cemetery, you pick your own time; please give Don a call to indicate which cemetery you want to do so he can coordinate who's doing which. A note of volunteers are noted on the cemetery list.

Since the clock read nearly quarter to ten, we adjourned these "grave" matters until next time.

Other notes:

- 1. The April 13th meeting will be a share session. Bring news of your projects and "goodies". We won't be having another share session until July.
- 2. The May 11th meeting features a slide show "The Favorite Photos of Cris Ketcham".
- 3. The June 8th meeting features a Greenville Cemetery tour with Harriet Rasmussen.
- 4. The Greene County Historical Society's Historic Home Registry Committee wants to have a Greenville representative. The duties are to attend committee meetings every 2-3 months and to establish input for the Greenville community. Currently, Greenville is not represented. Give me a call if you wish to be considered or know someone who would be a good representative.
- 5. Springtime and warm air means some of us have more time, or make more time, for various projects. Please consider adding to our files; a list of possible projects has already circulated but feel free to "do your own thing".


