On to the meeting. Most of the usual attendees got a call that the cemetery tour was postponed a month due to Harriet's illness. Thus, we staged one of our share sessions. About twenty came out on a warm June 8th evening.

Don Teator took the first half hour with an update of the cemetery project. Debra and he have photographed the cemetery stones of all the smaller cemeteries except for the following: O'Hara, the one between Drake Hill Rd and the radio tower on King Hill, Gayhead, Pine Springs, the one on Surprise Result Rd near Rt. 81, the one between Greenville Center and Rt. 81, and one-half of the Old Freehold cemetery. Over fifteen have already been photographed. All of the photographs were available for viewing. Don explained the necessity of a large mirror and sunlight for viewing the shady side of stones.

Robert Uzzilia's map of the Waldron cemetery was shown and will be included with the photographs in the near future. Kathy Williams told how she and Carol Lamb have mapped the Butler Cemetery on Rt. 26, the cemetery south of Greenville Center on county Route 41, and the cemetery in back of the Johannesen house on West Road. A thank you goes to Robert, Carol and Kathy for your worthwhile work.

Don promised the photographing of at least one of the three association cemeteries, with the completion of the project likely by next spring (leaves, grass, bugs and poison ivy have come to life since April). Volunteers are still needed for mapping should anyone want to partake in this worthwhile project. Ultimately, we would have a record of each stone and a list of names and epitaphs that could easily allow researchers to find the location of stones in the Town of Greenville.

In a related discussion, the naming of cemeteries arose as another project that should be done. We would like to refer to the cemeteries by their traditional names, if they have one. If they don't, we're going to name them. Enclosed in this mailing is an updated list of cemeteries sent a couple months back. Although it will be the end of summer before we arrive at a near-final list of names, please refer your knowledge of names of cemeteries.

In other topics, Dave Dively invited all to come to the Local History assembly June 16th. Dave explained the essay project and Don read Janet Parmiter's interview of Gene Smith. A thank you goes to Dave and the fourth grade teachers for their fine work and for what has proven to be a welcome addition to the Historian's files.

Arlene Brown brought a framed copy of the marriage

certificate of Lee's grandfather and grandmother.
The meeting ended shortly before 9:30 pm.
